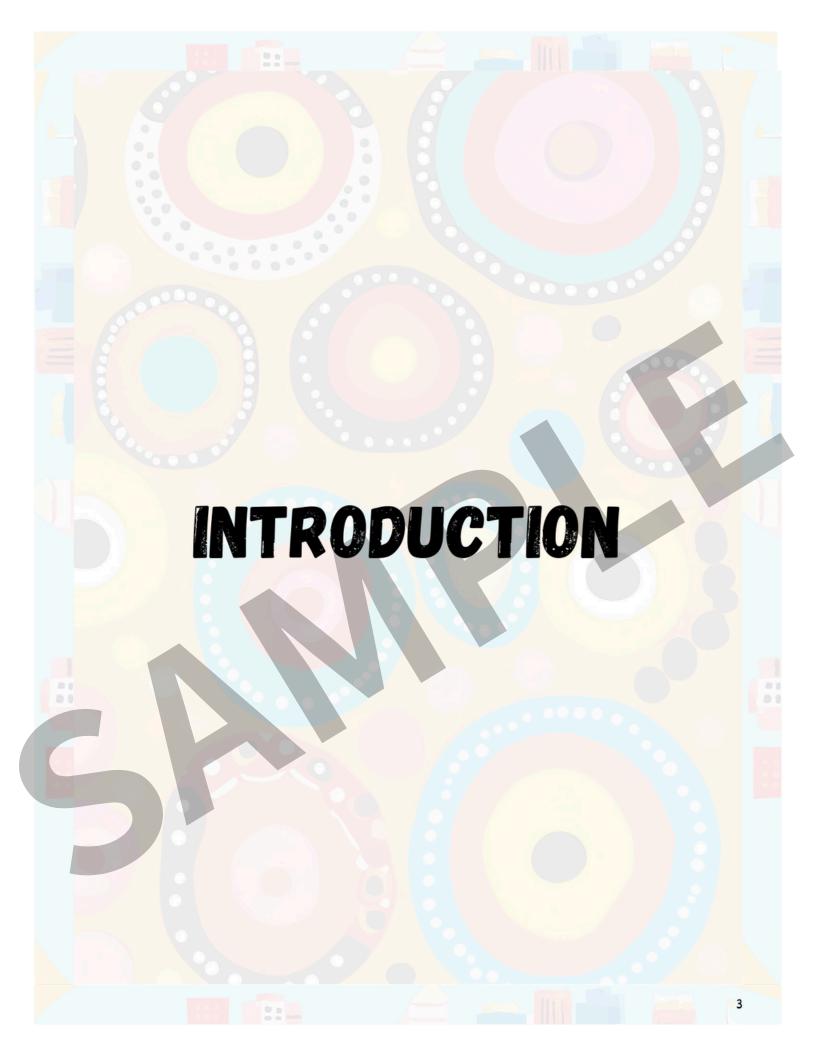

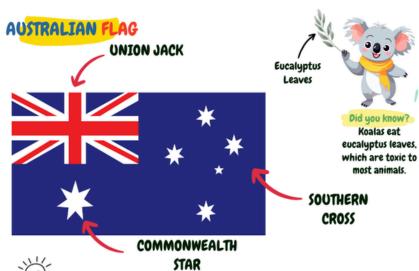

Commonwealth Star: Represents the six states and the territories of Australia.

Southern Cross: The five white stars form the Southern Cross constellation, a group of stars visible in the southern sky, which is important to Australians.

Black: Represents the Aboriginal people of Australia.

Red: The red stands for the earth and the strong connection Aboriginal people have to the land. It also reminds us of the struggles and bloodshed during conflicts with colonizers.

Yellow: Represents the sun, which is seen as a giver of life and a protector in Aboriginal culture.

They think the flag might look different without the Union Jack. What do you think about this idea? If you could design a new flag for Australia, what would it look like?

History of Australian Flag

A long time ago, right after Australia became a united country in 1901, there was a big contest to design a new flag. Designers from all over Australia sent in their flag ideas, and the winning design was chosen by the new government. They picked this new flag because it showed Australia's connection to Britain and its place in the southern part of the world.

The new flag was then approved by King Edward VII in 1901. Since then, the flag has been Australia's national flag, with just a few changes made to the stars.

Today, the Australia flag is an important symbol because it shows the unity of the states and territories, as well as the history as part of the British Commonwealth. This new flag makes people proud to be Australian!

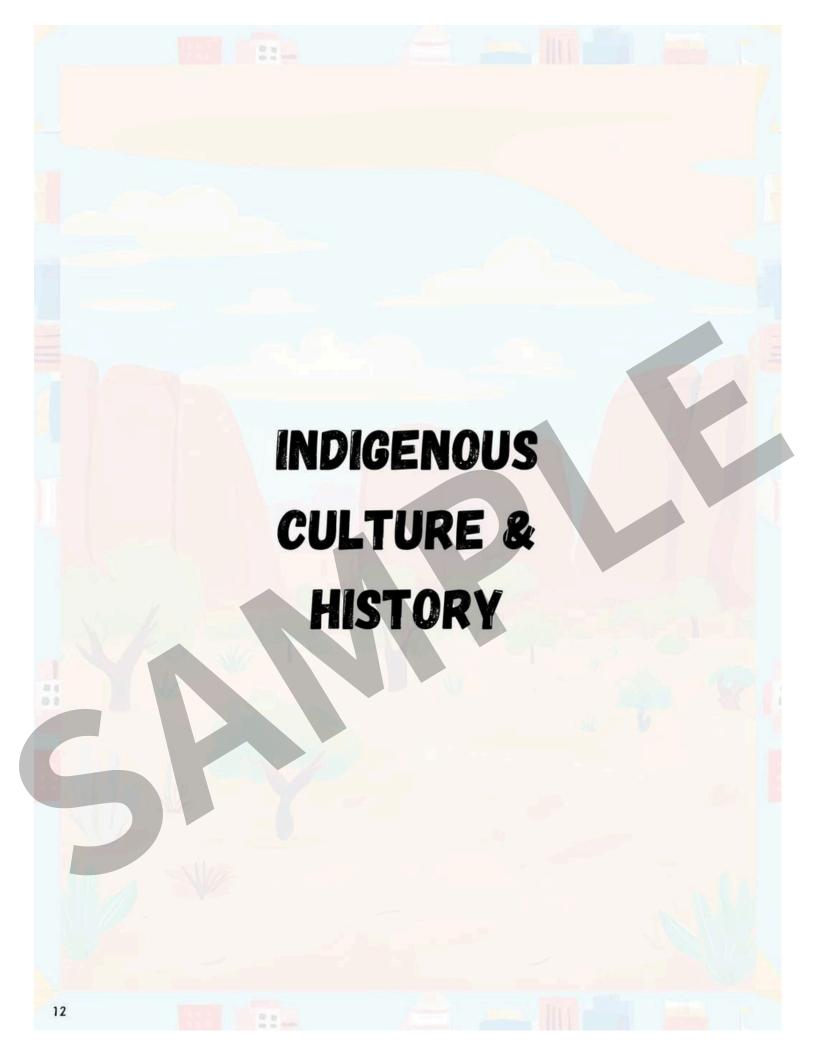

History of the Aboriginal Flag

Artist Harold Thomas designed the Aboriginal flag in 1971. It quickly became a powerful symbol for the Aboriginal rights movement. It was first flown in Adelaide during National Aborigines Day in 1971. Since then, it has been used in many celebrations and protests. It was officially recognised by the Australian government as a "Flag of Australia" in 1995. Since then, it is given the same importance as the national flag. The flag represents the deep and lasting culture and history of the Aboriginal people and their strong connection to the land.

The Aboriginal People

The Aboriginal people are the original inhabitants of Australia. Their culture dates all the way back over 65,000 years ago. This means that their history and culture is one of the oldest in the world!

Their unique cultures, languages, and traditions have been passed down from generation to generation. They did this through beautiful artwork, telling interesting stories known as "Dreamtime Stories", and ceremonies. They have created a rich culture with strong spiritual connections to the land.

Throughout the years, they have adapted to different environments such as deserts, rainforests, and knew a lot about the stars, medicine, and how to live sustainably.

Torres Strait Islander People

The Torres Strait Islanders are the Indigenous people from the Torres Strait Islands, which are located between the northern tip of Queensland and Papua New Guinea. Their culture is known for their close ties with the sea and their abilities to seafaring. Their language and traditions are separate from the Aboriginal people. Just like the Aboriginal people, they also have rich culture and have celebrations that include music, dance and ceremonies. Storytelling is also a big part of their culture as a way for them to teach lessons, explain the natural world, and keep the history and laws. As they are connected with the land and sea, traditional practices such as fishing and hunting are still practiced today.

SHORT HISTORY

65,000+ YEARS AGO







A long, long time ago, the first Aboriginal people came to Australia. They were the very first people to live on the land. They had amazing skills and traditions, like making beautiful art, telling important stories, and celebrating special ceremonies. They learned how to live in many different places, like hot deserts and lush rainforests. They knew a lot about the stars, how to stay healthy, and how to take care of the environment. The Aboriginal people have one of the oldest cultures in the world!

EUROPEAN EXPLORATION

Captain James Cook was an explorer from Britain who sailed to Australia on a ship called the HMS Endeavour. On April 29th, 1770, he and his crew landed at a place called Botany Bay, which is near Sydney today. They looked at the plants and animals there and made maps of the land. Captain Cook's maps showed that Australia could be a good place for people to live. On August 22, 1770, he claimed the eastern part of Australia for Britain and named it New South Wales. This was the start of a big interest in Australia by people from Europe.

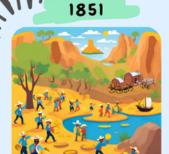
EARLY SETTLEMENTS

In 1788, eleven ships from Britain, called the First Fleet, arrived in Australia. They were led by Captain Arthur Phillip and carried around 1,500 people, including prisoners, soldiers, and officers. They first tried to settle at a place called Botany Bay but found it wasn't right. So, they moved to Port Jackson and set up the first European settlement at Sydney Cove on January 26, 1788. This date later becomes Australia Day. The new settlement had many problems like not enough food, sickness, and disagreements with the Indigenous people. Even with these challenges, the colony grew and started the story of modern Australia.



GOLD RUSH AND GROWTH

In 1851, people found gold in New South Wales and Victoria, starting a big gold rush. Edward Hargraves discovered gold near Bathurst, New South Wales. Soon, gold was also found in Victoria, especially in places called Ballarat and Bendigo. This made lots of people from all over the world come to Australia. The gold rush helped Australia grow quickly, especially Melbourne, which became a big city for money and culture. Even though there were some problems and arguments, especially with Chinese miners, the gold rush changed Australia a lot and made it more diverse.

Freshwater rivers and streams in eastern Australia and Tasmania.

Interesting Fact

Platypuses are one of the few venomous mammals, with males having venomous spurs on their hind legs.

Wombats are sturdy, burrowing marsupials with short legs and a compact body.

Habitat

Forests, mountains, and heathland in southeastern Australia.

Interesting Fact

Wombats have backward-facing pouches to avoid filling them with dirt while digging.

Wallabies are small to medium-sized marsupials similar to kangaroos but generally smaller.
